STRONG ACADEMIC OUTCOMES

83% of Higher Achievement scholars maintained an A or B or improved a letter grade in English Language Arts, and 78% did so in Math.

Scholars expanded their horizons thanks to strong community partnerships and dozens of engaging electives including yoga, art, cooking, chess, anime, drumming, sports, and more.

STRENGTHENING PARTNERSHIPS

Over the past year, Higher Achievement scholars benefited from expansive community partnerships and support.

In preparation for Richmond's Love Out Loud poetry and art showcase, scholars explored their creative talents thanks to electives led by community partner **Podium RVA** and **Roscoe Burnems**, Richmond's inaugural poet laureate.

Thanks to a new partnership with **BUILD**, DC Metro scholars had access to a new elective to help develop their entrepreneurial skills through BUILD's Design Challenge curriculum. In 2023, architecture firm **LSM** expanded its architecture workshops to engage more scholars and centers in learning about design principles through hands-on projects.

In Baltimore, scholars explored various art mediums, techniques, and history through **Maryland Institute College of Arts** Community Site Leaders program, and learned about what is required to bring a stage production to life in collaboration with **Everyman Theatre**.



In addition to Higher Achievement's rigorous academic enrichment, scholars have the opportunity to participate in clubs, electives, and field trips that expose them to new interests and career paths.

Electives

Dozens of different electives were offered throughout the year, including financial literacy, yoga, art, cooking, chess, anime, drumming, sports, and more. Mt. Royal offered a yoga elective for their scholars to cool down and de-stress through mindfulness and movement practices. During Lakeland's American Sign Language elective, scholars learned the basics of ASL, including the alphabet, introductions, emotions, and favorite animals.

Field Trips

DC Metro scholars visited the offices of two Higher Achievement partners in 2023: **Mayer Brown LLP** and **2U**. At Mayer Brown, scholars toured the office and spent time with attorneys, paralegals, and business professionals over meals; at 2U, scholars explored career paths in marketing and tech and data science.

In Richmond, scholars learned about the history, culture, and ecology of the region during field trips to the **Black History Museum** and the **Virginia Living Museum**. Scholars also toured the **University of Richmond** where they visited the athletics, business, science, and arts departments.

SCHOLAR SPOTLIGHT: SOFIA

8th-grade scholar Sofia credits participation in Higher Achievement with helping her build her self-confidence and become more outgoing. "Higher Achievement

> helped bring out the talkative and fun side of me," remarks Sofia. "I found it hard to make friends before, but now I am able to go up to someone and talk to them."

This newfound confidence didn't go unnoticed at school. Sofia's guidance counselor recommended that she consider trying out speech and drama. At first, the idea of going up on stage in front of an audience intimidated Sofia. "I could have said no, but I went with my gut because I knew it would be good for me. I can prove to myself that I can do it. The old me would be sacred. Now, I will be nervous, but not scared," says Sofia.
